



Breast surgery

Advice for going home after your procedure

This fact sheet explains what to do and what to expect in the first few days after breast surgery.

It's for people recovering from surgeries such as:

- removing a specific area in the breast (wide local excision)
- removing the breast without reconstruction (simple mastectomy)
- armpit surgeries, like sentinel node biopsy and axillary dissection.

If needed, you might get another fact sheet with more detailed information.

Looking after yourself

For the first 24 hours after your procedure:

- rest as much as possible - don't do any exercise, housework or cooking
- avoid heavy lifting and overstretching, like hanging washing, for at least 3 days
- don't drive a car
- don't drink alcohol
- don't use machinery or electrical appliances that could cause injury
- don't sign any legal documents
- be careful when walking and moving around - it's normal to feel lightheaded after anaesthesia or pain medicines.

Looking after your wound

Wear a well-fitted, wire-free bra for 3 to 7 days after your surgery, both day and night. This helps the internal wound heal and can reduce pain, bruising and swelling.

A nurse will check your wound before you leave the hospital and explain your wound care plan.

You may have 1 of 2 types of dressing

Option 1 - This dressing is caramel-coloured and waterproof. If you have this dressing, you can shower on the same day as your surgery. Don't use water that is too hot, as this may increase blood flow to the area and cause bruising or swelling. The dressing will stay in place until you return for your first post-operative appointment.

You might see some blood collecting under the dressing. This is normal.

If you have any concerns, for example, the dressing peels away or gets wet, there are blisters on the edge of the wound, or it leaks a lot, please contact a breast care nurse.

Option 2 - This option uses a glue-like dressing. If you have this dressing, you cannot shower for 48 hours after your surgery.

After 48 hours, you can shower as normal, and the glue will gradually wash away. There is no other dressing to remove.

Both options use stitches inside the body that dissolve over time.

Please leave all dressings on until your clinic review.

Infection after breast surgery is uncommon, but if you notice more pain, redness, swelling around the wound, or a fever, contact a breast care nurse.
