For the first 24 hours

- Make sure that you get adequate rest. No heavy lifting, housework, or cooking.
- Gently ease back into normal activities over the next few days.

What to expect after you go home

You may experience period-like cramping abdominal pain. This is normal and lasts a few days. It is usually relieved by taking ibuprofen, paracetamol, or the usual pain medicines you take for your periods.

Call us if you have any severe or increasing pain, which is not relieved by taking these medicines.

It is normal to have a slight blood-stained discharge or black, gritty discharge for up to four weeks after your treatment. You may notice a change to your period. It may be early, late, or missed completely. It may be light or heavy. If you are taking the oral contraceptive pill, you should continue to take it as usual.

Be aware of signs of infection

If you experience an offensive smelling discharge, high temperature or sweating, a sudden onset of pain or increased heavy vaginal bleeding see your local doctor (GP) or go to your nearest hospital emergency department.

Allow your cervix to heal

To allow the cervix to heal, you should not have vaginal intercourse, use tampons, or go swimming in spas or public pools for the first four weeks following treatment.

Important follow-up appointments

There is a small risk of further abnormal Pap tests and an ongoing or recurrent problem on your cervix. These will be detected at your follow-up appointments.

A letter with details of your ten-month follow-up review appointment in the Dysplasia Clinic will be sent to you. If you are unable to attend your appointment, please call our Appointments Line as soon as possible to reschedule your follow-up.
