### Re-credentialing as Shared Maternity Care Affiliates

Applications for 2023-2025 triennium: due Friday 9 December 2022

All current GP and obstetrician Shared Maternity Care Affiliates (SCMAs) for the Women's, Mercy Health, Northern Health and Western Health have been emailed applications for re-credentialing.

For those yet to apply, please register on "<u>TryBooking</u>" as soon as possible, with the submitted documents required to be uploaded by **Friday 9 December 2022.** 

You will be notified of the outcome by **28 February 2023.** All current providers will have their credentialing extended until then.

## Sandringham Hospital transition

From 6 February 2023, the management of maternity, neonatal and gynaecology services at Sandringham Hospital will transition from the Women's to Monash Health.

There will be no change to these services and patients will not be affected. The team will remain in place and they will continue to provide the same high-quality care as they do now.



With Monash Health providing maternity, neonatal and gynaecology services at Sandringham Hospital, care will be provided by a health service that is connected to the local needs of the community, while providing a tertiary service closer to home. This means urgent transfers will be quicker and it will be easier for families and visitors to be with a woman or baby should they need complex care on a ward or in a NICU.

#### Impact on referrals

From 6 February, referrals for Monash Health Women's services at Sandringham Hospital can be made via Monash Health's <u>Healthlink eReferral</u> system.

#### **Shared maternity care**

Women currently receiving shared maternity care at Sandringham Hospital will continue to do so from 6 February 2023.

If you are a current Shared Maternity Care Affiliate with the Women's and wish to continue to provide shared care at Sandringham Hospital, Monash Health will recognise your shared care credentials. However, you will need to complete their online form to be incorporated into their system.

To transfer your credentialing to Monash Health, please complete the <u>Monash Health Shared Maternity Care Affiliate Accreditation online form</u>.

When completing the form:

- For the mandatory attachment 'Curriculum Vitae', attach your Shared Care Credentialing Certificate from the Women's (if you need one, please email <a href="mailto:shared.care@thewomens.org.au">shared.care@thewomens.org.au</a>)
- If you have not yet re-credentialed for the 2022-2025 triennium, please ensure you provide evidence of at least 5 hours of continuing education in pregnancy-related care

### Referrals of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander patients

A reminder to GPs sending referrals to the Women's: If your patient is an Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander woman or baby, please indicate this in your referral.

This will result in your patient being connected with the Women's dedicated, culturally appropriate services, which ensure First Nations women and babies are appropriately supported and cared for at the Women's.



## Stillbirth Clinical Care

The Australian Commission on Safety and Quality in Healthcare has released a Stillbirth Clinical Care Standard. The Standard supports best practice in preventing stillbirth, investigations after stillbirth and bereavement care after any perinatal loss.

It is a valuable tool to support GPs and Shared Maternity Care Affiliates and includes a range of evidence-based information, including:

- assessment of stillbirth risk
- the use of ultrasound
- education, advice and action on fetal movements
- information and advice on maternal sleeping position
- · bereavement care
- investigations for stillbirth
- subsequent pregnancy care.



### **Public Fertility Service**

The Women's is receiving a high number of referrals from GPs and specialists for Victoria's new Public Fertility Service, which was announced by the Victorian Government in October 2022.

This publicly-funded service is available to all Victorian residents – including same-sex and other couples and single people with a donor.

To be eligible for this service:

• the patient must be a Victorian resident and holder of a Medicare card

• the egg to be fertilised (either patient's own or from a donor) must be no older than 42 years at time of treatment. This means that women using their own eggs must be 42 or less at time of egg collection.

If a patient does not meet the criteria for the publicly funded service, they may be eligible for our long-established low-cost fertility service.

If you are considering referring a patient to our public fertility service, your referral must include the results of several tests and investigations. To find out more, visit our <u>Public Fertility Service</u> webpage.

# Fertility preservation before cancer treatment

Did you know that half of young cancer patients don't have a discussion about their future fertility with their doctor, according to estimates?

Many cancer treatments, including chemotheraphy, radiation and surgery, can have a significant impact on fertility, and a person's ability to have biological children in the future.



Oncofertility experts from the Women's, Dr Violet Kieu and Associate Professor Kate Stern, are on a mission to ensure every Australian of child-producing age who is diagnosed with cancer is referred to onconfertility health services promptly.

They have combined their expertise to write an article "Starting cancer treatment? You should discuss fertility first", which was recently published in The Conversation.



# Referrals to the Women's

### Potential problem with some referrals not being received

There have been some instances where referrals faxed to the Women's appear not to have been received by us.

This is due to ageing facsimile machines in the community and technical issues related to the NBN in

some practices. This is expected to continue.

All referrals to the Women's are acknowledged in writing to the referring GP within a week. If a referral you have faxed is not acknowledged, please follow-up with our team at the Access Centre on GP Quick Access Number: Ph: 8345 2058 (then select option 2).

Meanwhile the Parkville precinct hospitals are actively working on a solution to develop e-referral.

### **COVID-19 updates**

If you are caring for a patient of the Women's who tests positive for COVID during pregnancy, please call our Parkville or Sandringham hospitals and ask to speak with the **COVID Liaison Midwife.** 

This midwife will call the patient, assess them, and arrange a care plan/referral to other services.

Alternatively, you can ask your patient to call our hospital directly to ask to speak with the COVID Liaison Midwife.


